MORE EDITORIAL COMMENT

Everyone read the October issue of that other magazine - ROWING ?

Anyone read the Peter Ayling comment on International policy ?

If you haven't seen it yet, find a copy. It makes interesting reading. In fact, if it is all a true and accurate report of the happenings at the top, just what on earth is going on? The sequence of events described by Peter is more like something out of slapstick comedy. Can it really be that our full time officials are really making such a mess of things? It makes you wonder whether the people involved would still be in a job should they be working for a company with responsible management.

Peter writes towards the end of his article that he hopes that the contents of his writings are intended as a criticism with constructive purpose, and not as a personal criticism against the people involved. My view is that those people who are responsible for the sequence of events described do indeed deserve criticism, and strong criticism too. These are the people who are running our governing body.

Of course, there are always two sides to every story, and the next issue of rowing intends to publish an interview with Penny Chuter, Director of Coaching, when all the points raised by Peter will no doubt be discussed.

On to a different subject now. Isn't it about time that compulsory time penalties were awarded against thos people who fail to arrive at the start of a Head Race on time? At the recent scullers heads, many of the scullers in the lower divisions were kept waiting until well after the scheduled start while the faster scullers ambled their way to the waters edge, and then up the course. We all know what it's like to sit in a boat for a long time. A suitable time penalty would guarantee that all scullers would be on the start line on time - I guarantee that.

The Northumberland ARA who organise the Tyne Head Race for coxed fours and eights did include in their prospectus a warning that crews could be penalised for late arrival, but as far as I know, the offenders were only penalised in one case. A compulsory time penalty I am sure would get the race underway at the scheduled start, and would mean that the early boaters would not be left sitting in the cold for an undue period of time.

What are your opinions ?

An obvious exception would be when the start of a race is delayed for safety reasons, as happened in this years Wansbeck Sculeers Head, when a decision had to be taken to shorten the course to eliminate the very real possibility that capsized scullers could have been washed over the Weir at the finish of the course.

If anyone has other views on how events could be run and improved upon, let me know. Your views will be published.

WELCOME BACK TO NORTH EAST ROWING NEWS

Astonishing though it may seem, it is some ten years almost to the day, that the first edition of the North East Rowing News appeared. It was founded in an attempt to provide a regular and comprehensive news letter for all clubs in the division 1 area of the Amateur Rowing Association following a rather basic opinion poll which revealed that such a publication would be very much appreciated. For some six years, regular editions of the news appeared and it was most gratifying to see the enthusiasm with which it was received, not only by those who although they had left the area, placed a regular subscription for it to be able to keep in touch. Durham regatta is to be held on a Saturday & Sunday this year. The course is being lengthened and deepened at the Pelaw Wood end. The Wharton will now be awarded to Elite Fours. Doubling up will now be permitted.

New clubs Selset Oarsmen and Teeside Polytechnic have been formed.

Kim Metcalfe of Durham ARC is proposing to start a novice fours league through the winter at Durham.

Mrs. Lester, Chairman of the Women's Rwoing Council, wished to discourage the view amongst the oarsmen of the country that women's rowing is all 'a bit of a giggle'

The opening of Holme Pierrepont is to take place in May.

D.U.B.C. new eight 'Prince Bishop' built by Sims of Twickenham is 45 lbs lighter than any other eight in G.B., and is the first boat to be built with carbon-fibre ribs. Cost is £1100! Stern is so hort that the cox appears to be sitting on the sternpost!

Bede college new boat 'Herbert Chicken II' cost £575.

As he watched the smoke and steam from local industry rising lazily into the clear blue sky and being mirrored in the glass-like waters of the River Tees on the morning of Monday the 15th ofOctober, your correspondent could not help but reflect what a splendid example of 'Murphy's Law' this presented! In this case the law would have stated - if anyone described the worst possible conditions in which to row a sculling head on the River Tees those conditions are most likely to present themselves on the actual day of the race! No prizes for guessing that this did in fact happen, and as the 29 competitors who covered the course from North Tees Power Station to Stockton will testify they had a far from comfortable ride. No less than four of the scullers took an early bath - we will not name them but suffice to say that Runcorn sculler E. Coldwell climbed back into his boat and finished in second place, only seven seconds behind Paul Johnson of Tees, the overall winner. That some surprising results were recorded almost goes without saying. Ironically, those who mastered the conditions bets - certainly five out of the top ten came from clubs where a three inch chop is regarded as rough condictions!

Worthy of note were the performaces of Mrs Angie Lund of Durham ARC who won the womens prize, Craig Routledge of Tyne RC, probably the smallest sculler in the race, and a novice at that, who won the Senior C restricted pennant, Craig Dunster, also of Tyne RC who can hardly be regarded as a veteran of long distance sculls who won the novice event, and Fred Greenwood of Durham ARC, that most loyal Veteran C/Novice supporter of regattas and heads who found himself finishing well ahead of a number of fast performers.

Torrential rain caused the River Wear to rise on the scheduled date of 4th November, and the conditions prompted the organiser John Massingham to cancel the event. A re-arranged race was held on the 10th November, and a field of 16 scullers (out of an original entry of 25) took to the water. Even on the re-arranged date, there was much debate as to whether the race should go ahead due to the strong current running; the final decision was to hold the race over the full course. For my view, it was a risky decision, and one which could have had severe repercussions if a sculler had capsized coming through Elvet Bridge - an extremely difficult manoevre in the conditions on the day. Perhaps I overdramatise - but having seen one person drown through absolute foolishness, and having pulled his body from the water some years ago, and having just recently read the newspaper cuttings of a Tarn crew that was swamped at Tees regatta some years ago, again with loss of life, I learn to treat water with the utmost respect, and would add that on occasions, event organisers perhaps do not give enough thought to the safety aspect. Remember that at the Wear L.D. Sculls there are no rescue craft. - I wasn't at the Tees Scullers Head, but I heard that this too could have ended dramatically.

Nevertheless, it is very pleasing to see University students promoting events - Too often is heard the cry: Why don't students put as much into the sport as they take out ? - Well, in the case of Hild/Bede, they have been putting on a pretty good event for some years now.

The race itself must have amused the onlookers around Elvet Bridge, with scullers coming through the inside arches - some diagonally, some sideways, and one very nearly upside-down! Most scullers took either easy arch or the very inside arch - but Dunster of Tyne RC had to do things the hard way when his teammate Denton became lodged against a parapet!
